John P. Montgomery Jan 19, 1942 - May 01, 2019.

John P. (Jack) Montgomery, age 77, died on May 1, 2019 surrounded by family after a short battle with lung cancer. Son of the late William R. Montgomery and Margaret Ennis, Jack was raised in Southwest Philadelphia with a crowd of lifelong friends whom he enjoyed seeing regularly. He was a general foreman at Sun Ship Building and later Penn-Ship in Chester, PA. Jack loved his grandkids, his tomato garden, reading, crossword puzzles, coffee, fishing, and following his Philadelphia sports teams. He and his wife Caroline resided in Aston and enjoyed neighborhood parties and walking his dog Stella.

Jack was married to his wife Caroline Crowell Montgomery for 51 years. They had four children: Lisa (Giuseppe) Palmarini, John (Lee Anne), Mike (Nicole) and Maureen (Paul) Mullins. He adored his ten grandkids and one great grandchild.

During my time at Sun Ship, Jack was an Assistant Foreman in the Transportation Dept (76D) and was responsible for all of the crane operators at the Yard, which numbered 61 operators as listed in our 1981 Seniority Book. Jack had been with Sun Ship for 17 years at the time of the sale of the Yard in 1982.

During the Yard demolition (2004-2005) in making way for the Harrah's Casino, we took over 8,000 photos of the demolition process. SSHS is in the 'continuing' process of collecting Sun Ship documents and artifacts. The latest acquisition is a model of our Grace Line Santa Isabel, Hull 638. The Grace line ships (Hulls 633 thru 638) was my 'second flight' of ships that I worked aboard as an apprentice in 33 Installation Dept. (Shipboard Electricians). My first flight of ships was the American Rover class (Hulls 628 thru 632) of which the American Racer (Hull 629) was the 'first' ship I worked on at the Yard in 1964. -continued on next page-
