When a new propeller is the Propeller for the 1940. The propeller is the largest 5-bladed propeller ever constructed in the United States. Its diameter is 20' 0" and its weight finished is over 25 tons.

In Figure No. 1, the hub has been upset (enlarged and bored) and the machine appears to be doing the job with a few minutes. As can be seen in the picture, the bottom blade cannot extend as far into the pit as a conventional 4-blade propeller which means that the whole fitting machine had to be raised 12 inches.

As shown in 2, the propeller is being "jacked" with a platform. (The pitch of a propeller is the distance the propeller would travel forward in one revolution if turning in a straight line.)

The platform is graduated by angle and has a mechanism used for raising it about 10 degrees. In turning the angle toward the horizontal side of the horizontal scale, with the use of the vertical scale, the pitch of the blade is any given value can be readily determined.
