Memo from John G. Pew, Jr.

PROJECT

In the Fall of 1941 my father called me into his office and was characteristically brief: "Let's have a monthly magazine to be sent to all employee families. I want it called OUR YARD and the first issue sent out for Liberty Day."

Just what prompted the decision, I'm not sure. There had been several mentions among employees of having a plant publication, but Sun like the majority of industrial firms had none. It had been approximately twenty years since the yard published a smaller magazine, the Sun Dial—but it didn't last.

Of one thing we may be sure, John G. Pew's purpose in starting a publication was a good deal more than a vehicle for the purchase of war bonds. As the first editor's statement said, "The hope is that as each issue of our family magazine is published, it may serve to knit the Yard into a closer family relationship." That I was the editor of the early issues I will never forget—for my father gave me just ten days advance notice before the first deadline! You may be sure I called for help.

called for help.

The last September issue of OUR YARD was Volume XVII, No.

1. We have therefore completed sixteen years, publishing twenty-eight pages (including four covers) every month for every employee. Bound copies, two years to each vol-ume, measure 14 shelf inches and weigh 42½ pounds. That's not surprising, because those 192 copies contain 5,376 pages. But heft doesn't make an em-ployee family project successful. We should measure in-

Without polling our readers, we can get a pretty fair idea of interest by surveying participation, because such a project best succeeds when all of the family pulls together. Well, how are we doing? Let's take the last five years.

Years.

Our first thanks go to the staff of volunteer reporters who have regularly gathered department news and spent a great deal of their personal time putting their columns together. This crew, currently numbering twenty, is the backbone—they have made the magazine possible, and for most, worthwhile.

Aside from department items we have had 60 individuals continued to the continued of the co

Aside from department items we have had 60 individuals contribute an original or selected item of a feature nature since Sept. 1, 1952. Nine of these, like our former safety engineer, E. E. White, have retired or left service. Outstanding has been rough and ready, outdoor editor Mike Znachko, who has come up with some fine writing, contributing Rod and Gun features in addition to toolroom news almost every month since former editor Bob Vale hooked him before this period began.

The next most frequent contributor is our dean of reporters, Dick Clandering who contributed twelve features in addition to maching

Clendening, who contributed twelve features in addition to machinist news. Dick would still be evident in these pages if our doctor hadn't insisted he cut out all extracurricular activity.

Naval architect Frank Pavlik wrote seven papers which were

printed; guarantee engineer Sterling Becton, six. Sales engineer Perry Shaver has developed five articles in as many years, as have hull superintendent Arthur Holzbaur and assistant foreman "Fireball"

superintendent Arthur Holzbaur and assistant foreman "Fireball" Bentley, who has covered the burning and welding departments regularly and well.

Tank tester Harold Baker wrote four pieces in addition to department reporting; chief engineer David Mylrea and Wetherill superintendent William Smith have done three features each.

Alphabetically, two-timers include: Howell Chetty, L. D. Collison, Jim Connor, William Craemer, Frank Hoot, Joe McBride, Harry Sanborn and John Techton. Here Mike Znachko turns up twice more in addition to the above mentioned sports and department news.

Thirty-three more from A to Z (Atkinson to Zeien) have at least fired one shot into OUR YARD. Half of this group are department heads and supervisors—a pretty good showing for salaried personnel. But where do we go from here?

The current editor reports that he has asked many employees

The current editor reports that he has asked many employees to contribute an item without success. He too, wishes to keep OUR YARD of the "home grown variety" by having readers submit their own articles. There is almost no limit to subject no limit to subject matter. We have had some good features on department functions from semitechnical to humor-ous — vacation and ous — vacation and hobby stories, and others of historic or cultural character. The trouble is that we don't receive enough of them.

Is it too much to ask that each executive, superintendent and department head makes a genuine ef-fort to write or select at least one item

enough of them.
Certainly we should not lean so heavily for feature items on the volunteer staff which already is devoting time and thought in department columns.

every year? This alone would put us in a selective position as far as material is concerned—improving the quality of the magazine generally. What about some new authors from the hourly role? Some of our most entertaining and educational pieces have come from men who "never wrote a thing" in their lives before! We included a short, informal piece called "Anyone Can Write" in the October 1956 issue, to encourage the beginner. Writing is basically thinking on paper. All of us can think—and write—if we will but take the time. Get some paper and start accumulating notes of ideas and facts you think are interesting when they first occur to you. You'll be surprised how quickly and easily you will have enough material for a feature in OUR YARD. You'll be pleased how little organizing and rewording of original notes is needed to make a satisfactory article in print. Finally, when our former chef left service, we lost one feature for our female readers—menus. There is no doubt in my mind that many employee wives or daughters and Sun Ship girls can contribute material to establish a clever and stimulating women's page. How about it, you girls? Will you give it a try?
